In my opinion

"Education...is painful, continual and difficult work to be done in kindness, by watching, by warning,... by praise, but above all -- by example." -- John Ruskin (8 February 1819 – 20 January 1900) was the leading English <u>art</u> <u>critic</u> of the <u>Victorian era</u>, as well as an art patron, <u>draughtsman</u>, watercolourist, a prominent social thinker and philanthropist. He wrote on subjects as varied as geology, architecture, myth, ornithology, literature, education, botany and political economy.

This week has been dedicated to our **Parent, Pupil, Teacher interviews,** where we are positive that the time spent in preparation and execution has been a positive experience for all concerned. This time has given us an opportunity to share some of the levels of achievement and an indication of what steps will need to be taken for the achievement levels to improve or at the very least be consistent.

It does take a number of people to develop a child, and in my opinion not necessarily a "village" – the student needs to be aware of their ability and potential, the relationship between the teachers and the student, support and direction from their parents, and ensuring that at this age group, and that there are many opportunities available.

I apologise to you all for the changes that we have made with our staffing this year, and that will surely affect the relationship building. I thank our replacement teachers for stepping in and moving quickly to minimise the disruption, and to also compliment our students on their resilience.

I am positive that we can continue to work toward what is best for our students, and how this continued work and support will be our focus for the rest of this year.

We have tried to share the levels of achievement with you by continuing to use National Standards, the system you as a parent will have understood, and also shared with you our probable direction for the future with Curriculum and Progressive levels.

In my opinion, a number of areas are the same as National Standards, but by another name, "**A rose by any other name would smell as sweet**"- Wiremu Shakespeare. The reference is often used to imply that the names of things do not affect what they really are. This formulation is, however, a paraphrase of Shakespeare's actual language.

However, National Standards are to be taken out, and we have work to do to replace that system. We will be endeavouring to apply the following from the **Principles of effective reporting and information sharing.**

The principles that guide effective reporting and information sharing are set out in the table below. These are taken from the <u>Framework for effective information sharing</u> that sets out the principles for effective information sharing and expected outcomes, supported by the evidence from research, policy and regulation. Foundations for learning are those essential skills - reading, writing, mathematics and key competencies - that will assist ongoing learning across the curriculum.

If information is being reported and shared effectively, these are the likely outcomes:

- School practices add to family practices and family practices add to school practices.
- Teachers know about their students' identity, language, culture, interests and talents.
- Students/ākonga know that their teachers respect who they are.
- Parents and whanau are clear about what their child has achieved and the progress their child has made across the breadth of the curriculum, including the curriculum vision of confident, connected, actively engaged, lifelong learners.
- Parents and whānau can clearly see students' progress and achievement in literacy, numeracy, key competencies and 'learning-to-learn' skills.
- Students/ākonga are clear about what they have learnt, which learning strategies were successful, what they need to focus on next and why it is important.
- Student/ākonga, parent and whānau motivation to support learning is enhanced.
- Students/ākonga who would normally 'switch off' when faced with low achievement remain motivated.

• Parents and whanau can see their child's progress on-line in real time.

• Parents, whānau and the wider community use a range of technologies to support their children's learning. Parents and whānau:

- Are confident interacting with their children's teachers.
- Feel their views are valued.
- Understand where their children are at, what progress they have made and what they need to learn next.
- Know where to access the information and resources they need to support their children's learning.

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<u>Hawkes Bay Mathletics</u> - On Tuesday and Wednesday, we sent a group of students (9 Yr 7s and 9 Yr 8s) over to Hastings in order to compete in the annual Mathletics competition. Students competed in teams of 3 and there were three rounds:

10 x individual questions, 10 x timed questions and 30 x team questions. Both year 7 and year 8 teams all finished in the Bronze zone (top 30% of teams). So congratulations to everyone.

Female Students Self-defence Course
