CLASS SKI TRIPS

By now, our Class Ski trips would be on the calendar for this term, but we have spent some time negotiating with RAL – the Ski Company about the cost of these trips. Initially they raised the cost to schools here in Taupo and district this year, by quite a margin, and we refused their first offers.

We had met with the company to express our views on the pricing structure. It also gave us an opportunity to inform them that we as a school promote the ski trips as a new experience for our students and for some this will probably be the only ski trip to our mountain, and that in our school no student misses out on trips because of money.

We have resubmitted our application for a fairer deal, and believe, we now have an acceptable level of costings that will help our students. We expect to be able to get our letters organized to let you know what days and dates your child will be able to participate in the ski trip and at what cost.

These happen toward the end of the year, but you should expect to be getting information about these camps and activities shortly – venues, costings, transport and Parent help and support.

- To turn up to school every day and on time 8:50am too many students wandering into school late problems start from this habit on the way to school, if they make it, or when they get to school. RING OR TXT the school for student absences, or your child will be marked as being truant. This attendance figure goes onto your child's record, and to the Ministry of Education. HUGE THANK YOU TO THE PARENTS WHO DO THIS
- **NO CELL PHONES** are necessary at our school, students can get teacher permission to use our school phone. We have no way of controlling cell phone use, or access to unsuitable sites or contacts. At least we have some control of the access for our computer systems in the school. If phones are required for after school, they should handed into the school office every morning and collected after school.
