We have 590 x students and surely that should generate a full time position??

I see no value in comparing our workloads and conditions with any other profession, for example the nurses – their workload and conditions are totally different to ours. Just look at our profession and ask the question why are we not attracting people into our profession??

Thank you to all the parents who support us and may that continue in our fight for a descent **'Honorarium**'. Our students are at the centre of our profession and the work that we do with them is extremely important and it is always delightful to see them achieving in so many areas.
