
Striving for Excellence

EARLY NOTIFICATION OF POSSIBLE INDUSTRIAL ACTION

That there is planned, rallies, events and gatherings to support primary teacher and principal rolling strike action 13th November for Taupo Schools.

Events are happening up and down the country to send a strong message to the Government that it is time to fix the crisis in teaching.

This means freeing teachers to teach so every child receives the personal attention they need to learn and thrive. It means freeing principals to focus on leading and it means ensuring we have enough teachers by attracting more people to teaching, by respecting them as professionals and paying them properly.

➤ EARLY NOTIFICATION ON THE LAPTOP PROGRAMME FOR 2018

At the end of this year, subject to the behind the scenes configuration being complete, we will have a different decommissioning process for year 8 laptops and for any Year 7 pupils that are not returning or have been taken off the roll.

This process is designed to enable pupils to use their laptops at school right up till the end of the school year and requires no teacher intervention i.e. Teachers will no longer need to RIS the laptops at the end of the year.

Our teachers will work with our students so that:

- Pupils need to be fully aware that their laptop will be completely reset and that they will lose all personal files and programmes.
- Pupils need to be fully aware that all student accounts, of leaving students, will be deleted at any time between the 15th December and the 20th December which means that they will no longer have access to Office365 including One Drive.
- Pupils need to understand that their laptops will no longer have office programmes on them as these are licenced to the school. They do not need to buy these programmes as these will be available again to them from the high school they attend.
- Pupils need to understand the options that they have in terms of how to save their personal data and be given instruction if necessary.
- Laptops that have not been fully paid for will be retained by the school until paid for or relinquished and these will be collected <u>well in advance</u> of the end of the year.
