There is no doubt in our minds that this past week has been difficult to comprehend and I guess it's because this type of thing doesn't happen in our country. Well it has, and we need to take some time to reflect and then move on particularly for the sake of our students – your children. We need to look at ourselves and reflect on our own practices, and perhaps prejudices, and how we in fact treat other people.

I have spoken with staff and students this week, about the way we disrespect and treat each other, and this type of behaviour being no different than the attitude and actions of the gunman, be it on a greater scale.

I would like to see "no" violence between our students, and that we will find alternative methods of resolving issues. That verbal assaults with racist overtones would be forbidden, and that Social Media sites be permanently such down if they can't behave responsibly.

I would like us to work on changing our attitude towards one another. If we are to truly respect those who have unnecessarily died, this would be a lesson learnt, that we don't have to tolerate violence in our homes, streets and schools.

"I am writing to you so that you will be aware of the mosque shooting video that was livestreamed on Friday. Students may well have viewed this video. The Chief censor has classified this video as objectionable – anyone who shares it could face up to 14 years in prison. You may have seen the NZ Herald article which refers to this.

As a result Netsafe has drafted the below message to provide information and support for schools. They have asked the Ministry of Education and all the Directors of Education for our assistance to quickly get this message out to all students via our your own networks. Can you please disseminate the Netsafe advice below (in italics) to your networks as soon as you are able.

Netsafe has received a number of reports of online content relating to the attacks in Christchurch. Footage of the attacks has been deemed objectionable under New Zealand law which means that possessing or distributing the footage is an offence. Anyone who finds footage of the attacks online should report it to Netsafe at netsafe.org.nz/report but they should not keep copies or share it. Netsafe encourages schools to speak with students about what to do if they come across the footage and about the fact that sharing the footage with this classification is against the law.

The footage of the Christchurch attacks is disturbing and will be harmful for people to see. If students have viewed the video and are struggling with what they have seen it's likely they will require additional support. Agencies which can provide free support include <u>Youthline</u>, <u>Need to Talk</u> and <u>Kidsline</u>.

While the content is online there is some risk that children or young people may come across it. Netsafe encourages schools and parents to proactively discuss with young people what they should do if they come across distressing content online. SCHOOL LAPTOP PROGRAMME

• Important notice As of this week support for ex-lease hp laptops bought through the school in 2015 and 2016 ceases. No new enrolments will be able to use these laptops on our system. Pupils already enrolled and using these laptops will still be supported until they leave the school. Toshiba laptops bought in 2017 will be phased out in 2020. Desktops are available for pupil use or there is still an option of opting into the current laptop programme.

Insurance for 2019 Lenovo 300e laptops; The insurance process is slightly different.


