I can only thank my students and teachers for their efforts on this day and thank the many parents who came along and supported us.

Our weekly competitions continue, with our hockey teams all competing on Wednesday evening, and our netballers battling it out on Saturday morning. Again, I want to thank my teachers for giving of their time to be with these teams, and to the college students and parents who help coach, manage and umpire.

Please respect their time and effort, and I repeat many times, that we would be one, if not the only school in this town, that has so many teachers looking after our school teams and getting so much support by us all.

It is disappointing when our students are so proactive in getting involved with some of our community held events that the rules change, or the fees increase. This tends to put more pressure on our parents who are already trying to fund other aspects of life.

In my opinion some of these conditions and expenses are totally unnecessary, and I refer for example, to the changes to the Around the Lake Cycle Event, which has had some many changes, that it has taken the gloss off such a prestigious event. The relay aspect was changed, the fees have increased, and now this year changes have been made to the student eligibility. We have had students involved in this event for many years – 15- 16 years – and is one of our Bevan Docherty Challenges. Well you have to bring along another adult or you can't ride the event, and that adult will have to pay an adult price. Is this necessary or just another way of increasing revenue??

We are seriously looking at running alternative challenges for our students for the future, another adversity??? It doesn't help us getting students physically involved when we are faced with these obstacles. Makes a mockery out of all the political campaigns wanting schools to get students active, and helping with obesity and health issues, when they don't actually realize how expensive it is for them to join in these activities.

Well done to all our active students, teachers and parents – KEEP UP THE EFFORT!!!!

We have a number of planned activities coming up – (thanks Baz for the reports)

ICAS Tests: Students wanting to sit one or more ICAS tests (these are part of the Principals Academic Award) can collect an entry form from the office. Subjects include Digital Technologies, Science, Spelling Bee, Writing, English and Mathematics, with all subjects this year are being sat online. Entries must be in by next Thursday 15th August.

Taupo Cycle Challenge/Bevan Docherty Award: Several years ago, we put together goals for the three awards (Bevan Docherty Award, Principal's Academic Award and the Donovan Bixley Award) to promote the involvement of students in outdoor, academic and cultural activities. The goals initially set have altered over time, especially with the Bevan Docherty Award as events change, costs increase etc.

This year the Taupo Cycle Challenge management have placed a minimum age of 12 years, and the requirement is to have an adult accompany each student on the 40, 80, or 160km road cycle.

While on the Huka Teaser Mt Bike, the age restrictions state students 12 years and over can ride alone, or 10-11 year old with an adult. For those families who have difficulty with this new requirement, we are trying to get use of the Taupo Motor Sport Park to run a 40km road cycle in October, and for those wanting to Mt Bike we will arrange a group ride on the Huka Teaser early in November.

Class Ski Trips: Unfortunately, due to the prolonged spell of rough weather we have had to postpone or cancel several ski trips. While there is a slim chance we can reschedule, with there being so many called off, we will probably end up cancelling them. As stated in the original newsletter any money paid will be credited to the students accounts for activities and camps later in the year. We ask that if at all possible, payments are left credited to your account as refunding puts a huge amount of extra work on our office staff due to current school banking requirements.

Next week I will bring you up to date with my thoughts on the traffic lights recently installed, and other changes to the roads, footpaths and speed limits.
