We appreciate you completing the Level 3 survey regarding your students returning to school next Wednesday the 29th. April 2020.

With this information we have now established an onsite roll of those students who will attend school and a roll for those who are offsite. These rolls will remain in force until the next review of the Covid 19 levels. You will not be allowed to change from one roll to the next.

As always, the care and wellbeing of our students and staff is paramount. In order to keep students and staff safe, we have worked on a thorough plan and have allocated students into a bubble that they will stay in for the duration of Level 3 lock-down. The parents and students are receiving emails directly.

During level 3 parents are not allowed to come into school grounds, if you have any issues you can contact us via email (<u>admin@taupointermediate.co.nz</u>) or phone (378 8097). If you must come to school, you must come into the office which has a **"one in and one out system"** operating.

There has been a lot of work to make sure school is safe, thank you for your support during this time. As you know this is a new experience for us, so we are asking for your time and patience with the systems we have put in place. We will review these daily to ensure our students are safe, happy and learning.

We appreciate all our teachers work who have committed to provide online and onsite learning. We also have teachers who are unable to be onsite for various reasons, but they will also continue to provide online learning from home.

The present situation and our roll will continue as is while level 3 alert is in place. If there is any change to levels, we will communicate with you.
