In my opinion:

After this week's chapter of errors and debacle I certainly hope that we indeed 'still come out of it' and the 'it', I am referring to is that with these errors of judgement we don't lapse back into any Covid-19 Levels and be forced to reinstate a number of barriers we have taken down.

At our schools we have had to deal with many different scenarios as we have 650 x students here and a huge number of family units. We have 35 x staff working here as well and to implement the requirements stipulated by the Government.

As we have progressed through the levels, we have all worked very hard to adhere to these constant changes and to now be in a situation that we may have to revert to other levels is disheartening.

We were told in the many broadcasts that **if we were complacent** then there would be a possibility that we would go back through the levels and did we want to go backwards?

To all of us in our community – we haven't been complacent!! – so don't just apologize about those who were complacent and apologize to all of us who have worked hard for the past 2 x months, who have had to sacrifice a lot and in some cases lost a lot.

It is tiring for all of us here as we feel like we have had to start our school year all over again, like the start of each year.

Our students must:

- re-learn all our expectations and learn to socialize again, to get on in a larger group.
- be placed back on a timetabled day and to work with different teachers and personnel onsite.
- realize that complete freedom, to do what you want, when you want, is not always possible and you have to consider others beside yourself.

I have spoken to many school colleagues who express the same sentiments, that it is taking some time, for students to reintegrate back into the school system particularly, when we have students still drifting back in.

I am asking for some patience and your continued support to help us get this right and then of course in two weeks time we have the next set of holidays, which may raise the point that should we have the holiday break or just carry on through.

The short answer to that is no we need this break as we did not get the last holiday break back in April. We didn't have a choice, we were told to lockdown the school, get on-line learning sorted in a three day timeframe and then suddenly were told without consultation, that you can stop now, you are on holiday break the very next week. Not one of the greatest decisions ever made as we had students and teachers still communicating and setting up the On-Line Learning and us trying to sort out which students could access internet and devices – which by the way we still haven't got here at school.

Moving on though we are still making changes to our programs, to try and get our students involved, not helped by the continued restrictions.

- **Basketball starts tonight** Friday evening with 'friendly games''- Spectators to be seated in the seating gallery and not on the playing floor

- Musical Production rehearsals have started
- Kapa Haka is well underway along with the TIS Band and our Dance group
- Students are currently working on their Science Fair Investigations
- Class Ski Trips for 2020 have been cancelled

This season RAL the company who are running the mountain, has decided to open only 4 x lifts for midweek skiing:

- Happy Valley Platter 1 (short beginner lift)
- o Happy Valley Platter 2 (short beginner lift)
- o Sky Waka Gondola (longest run on mountain- intermediate/advanced)
- o Knoll Ridge T-Bar (intermediate/advanced T-Bar)

With only 2 x platter lifts working for beginners and not the Double Happy Chair or the Rangatira Express Chair, Whakapapa's beginner terrain is reduced to app 25% of its normal area.

Most Taupo Intermediate students would soon get bored and then need to step up from these lifts.

Though unfortunately the jump from riding the platter lifts and their low/near horizontal angle to down through the Waterfall (from the Sky Waka) or the Shirtfront or Gut (from Knoll Ridge T-Bar) would be dangerous and foolhardy.

So, we have no alternative but to cancel these bookings for our class based Ski trips and will now look at possible alternative outdoor activities which could be undertaken by classes possibly by specific year groups (year 7 or year 8).

- Ski Race Camp in the Memorial Lodge will continue for this season in week 2 of next term. Running trials during the July holidays, then selecting 15 to 20 students for ski training, covering carving, ski maintenance, safety, ski field knowledge etc. This would help with race skills for next year's team, use the hut and give Rana ideas for future years.
- End of Year Camps and day activities

At present, most of the newsletters have gone out regarding end of year camps, giving dates, activities, fees etc. along with asking for parent support

Year 7 classes activities have started with the Waiouru trip which they are finding extremely valuable. The cost for this trip is being paid by the school as a curriculum activity.
