"Ka puta Matariki ka rere Whānui. Ko te tohu tēnā o te tau e! Matariki re-appears, Whānui starts its flight.

Being the sign of the [new] year! Matariki - Māori New Year

Matariki literally means the 'eyes of god' (mata ariki) or 'little eyes' (mata riki)

Twinkling in the winter sky just before dawn, Matariki (the Pleiades) signals the Māori New Year.

Traditionally, it was a time for remembering the dead, and celebrating new life. In the 21st century, observing Matariki has become popular

again. Heaven-bound kites, hot-air balloons and fireworks help mark the occasion.

Matariki is the Maori name for the small cluster of stars also known as the Pleiades or the Seven Sisters, in the Taurus constellation. In New

Zealand it comes into view low on the north-eastern horizon, appearing in the tail of the Milky Way in winter, just before dawn. This heralds

the Māori New Year.

Matariki celebrations were popular before the arrival of Europeans in New Zealand, and they continued into the 1900s. Gradually they dwindled, with one of the last traditional festivals recorded in the 1940s. At the beginning of the 21st century Matariki celebrations were revived. Their increasing popularity has led some to suggest that Matariki should replace the Queen's birthday as a national holiday.

When Te Rangi Huata organised his first Matariki celebrations in Hastings in 2000, about 500 people joined him. In 2003, 15,000 people came. Te Rangi Huata believes that Matariki is becoming more popular because it celebrates Maori culture and in doing so brings together all New Zealanders: 'It's becoming a little like Thanksgiving or Halloween, except it's a celebration of the Maori culture here in Aotearoa New Zealand. It's New Zealand's Thanksgiving.' - by Paul Meredith

One of these was the closure and restrictions we had to cope with, and I am positive that we all did extremely well. During the campaign we were implored by the Prime Minister to "Be Safe and Be Kind" and now that we are at level one, we have decided that none of these things seem to matter.

I have been again proud of the way the majority of our students have returned to school who have put their heads down and tried to recover some of the academic ground they may have lost, but in saying that thank goodness we had a comprehensive online programme and capacity to cope with this. - Engage regularly with your child and with our school early intervention is our preferred option
- Continue to support the school as we cannot do this job on our own it is supposed to be a partnership. We want to hear about the good things that are happening as well.

"The staff at the Taupo Hospital Dental Clinic will be resuming routine preventive appointments starting with the Year 8 students. This will include examination, X Rays & fluoride treatment if their consent allows. We will book them in to our diaries, however our new booking system means parents may receive a text informing them of the appointment the day before. Parents may attend if they want to, otherwise

we will just get them from school as we have done in the past. The dental team will assess your child for any symptoms before their appointment in line with Alert Level 1 guidelines from Lakes District Health Board. Should any student be symptomatic they will be rescheduled"
