On Wednesday 24th August 2022 all our staff at Taupo Intermediate School attended a Professional Development Course, working with Michael Carr- Gregg – Australian Psychologist who also spoke to all the Intermediate Principals at our Conference held at Wairakei 21st – 23rd August 2022.

Michael shared some thoughts and ideas:

- The growth of the adolescent brain and the circumstances and consequences that are associated with this development
 - The rising depression and anxiety among Kiwi youths
 - Since the onset of the Covid 19 pandemics, admissions of children and adolescents to hospital following self harm events have increased by 25% in the 15–19-year age group and 50% in the 10-14 age group
 - Over 5600 young people presented to hospital emergency departments around the country with self-harm in 2021 alone
- Why Michael Carr-Gregg is a fan of Intermediate Schooling
 - A successful early adolescence is pivotal to a successful adulthood
 - o Ostensibly designed to bridge the gap between primary and post primary schools
 - Provides specialist courses to suit the educational needs of early adolescents.

His website has a mountain of material for you as parents and I recommend you visit the site. Michael is one of Australia" highest profile psychologists, author of 14 books, broadcaster and a specialist in corporate mental health, families, parenting, children, adolescents, and the use of technology for mental health.

We also be worked with Joseph Driessen - on using attachment strategies to improve relationships and managing challenging behaviours. He states that this attachment starts form home and an early stage of development.

- 1. When we work with our own children we nurture them, stimulate, and soothe
- 2. The child responds and becomes emotionally bonded or attached to the parent.
- 3. The child now feels secure and plays and explores and the parent encourages autonomy.
- 4. If the child feels anxious, it turns to the parent for help and once supported and the child resumes exploring and learning (Safe haven)
- 5. The parent guides the child to keep it safe and teaches it the social contract.

Secure Attachment in the classroom:

1.Form secure relationships with their teachers easily 2. Are confident and curious 3. Are full of energy 4. Are socially skilled 5.Can communicate well 6. Can emotionally self-regulate 7. Are willing to take reasonable risks 8. Able to take part in sustained activities

I am positive that our staff have benefit hugely from these sessions, as it has provided some ideas and support, some more tools in our toolbox for us to cope with the stressful times we are all having in schools. Your parental support is vital and has supported us in having a successful and fulfilling day.

Nicholas Ross from Year 8 presented his investigation into the heat energy stored in different varieties of nuts. Bailee Sweetman from Year 8 demonstrated how you can use a refractometer to identify when sugar levels changed in different fruits.
