
The Stars of Matariki

GREENING TAUPO & TAUPO INTERMEDIATE

Last Friday Room 2 & 4 students generously helped Greening Lead teacher, Matua Mason, and KGT Coordinator, Rachel Thompson, KGT student leaders, and volunteers, transplanting harakere in the gully as the area is being developed to become an outside classroom. KGT Coordinator kairuruku reo Māori, Hinemoa Karaitiana taught the students about tikanga of cutting harakeke. Students worked hard all morning digging, splitting, trimming, and replanting the harakeke. Andrea from <u>Blue Light</u> Taupo joined us again to help out. Andrea worked tirelessly with year 7 classes, KGT coordinators, and Greening student leaders last year in the removal of the thick jasmine that was smothering the native trees. Another surprise visitor was landscape architect, Herwi Scheltus, who spoke to the tamariki about the plans he has drawn up from student ideas. The next step is to have paths dug and to replant the understory with native species. TIS Greening students are designing informative signage to go by the mature native trees. A big Thanks to Contact Energy for the \$1000 prize from Greening Taupō Day last year, which is contributing to plants and resources for this school project.
