<u>SCIENCE</u> TECHNOLOGY

Term one – Week 10

This week in Science

This week Year 7 students were learning about one way that scientists carry out scientific investigations – using scientific method. Their purpose was to find out which type of acetic acid produced the most carbon dioxide gas when it reacted with sodium bicarbonate. In other words, which vinegar and baking soda reaction produced the best reaction. At the end of this messy investigation, their results showed that balsamic vinegar had the best reaction due to it having the highest acidity.





Year 8 students designed and conducted a scientific investigation into whether salt water or fresh water retained heat the longest. They learnt about the density and buoyancy of salt and fresh water before designing an experiment to test their hypothesis. They used the burners to heat the different types of water to a temperature that they decided on, and then decided how to measure how much heat was lost over a certain period of time. Their results showed that sea water retained heat longer due to its density.
