In Term 1 students learnt different genres of art pieces using a range of techniques, strokes, and processes. They then used this knowledge to create their pieces of art.

Year 8's explored identity & cubism by designing a Pablo Picasso portrait using paint, pastel, line, colour & different 3D views of facial features. They turned out amazing.



Two Year 7 classes created a Visual Autobiography to get to know each other using a variety of images to reflect information about themselves. They also experimented with zentangle designs. I loved the variety of colour combinations & designs.

The theme for this term is Curiosity. As part of this, students will conduct a scientific investigation or a technology investigation. Most students will do a scientific investigation which must be a fair test. They should start by choosing something they are interested in, or something they really want to test. For example:

- · Does listening to music help us concentrate?
- · Are boys who play football better at kicking goals than girls who play football?
- Do gamers have faster reaction times than nongamers?

Students then must design and conduct an experiment to test this. It must be a FAIR TEST...

- O They only CHANGE one thing. This is what they are testing e.g. boys kicking goals and girls kicking goals. It is called the independent variable.
- o They must MEASURE one thing. This is what changes as a result e.g. the number of goals they kick. This is called the dependent variable.
- o Everything else must stay the SAME e.g. keep the ball the same. These are called the controlled variables.

Students then present the findings of their experiments (science fair board, poster, diorama etc) and enter it into the school science fair which will be held in week 8 and week 9. TIS whanau, and students from our contributing primary schools will be invited to come and view the science fair in Week 9.

The other option is a technology investigation. Students may have identified a problem or a need that they want to solve, and they would follow the steps of the design process to develop a product that provides a solution.

Please feel free to contact your child's classroom teacher, or Ms Turanga the science teacher, if you require further information.

We look forward to seeing what the curious minds of our future scientists and inventors come up with.

# **Uniform**

Students are expected to wear and have their full uniform to begin school here at Taupo Intermediate. It is to be worn with pride and a high standard is important. Formal Uniforms (pictured below) and sports tracksuits are provided to students who represent our school and must be returned clean and tidy after use.



## ALL UNIFORM ITEMS WILL HAVE THE TAUPO INTERMEDIATE LOGO:

Jersey — Navy Woolen (Optional)
Polar Fleece— Royal Blue & Navy
Polo shirt — White with Navy Trim
School Socks — Boys—Royal Blue/white stripes
Boy's Shorts — Dark Navy
Girl's Skort — Dark Navy

Plain Navy Blue Trackpants: (available from – Brand fuel) Optional for winter – choice of straight or gathered leg at ankle. (No logos or snap-pants) N.B. Black is not allowed.

**Footwear:** Plain Black Shoes or Black Leather Roman Sandals – Back strap worn done up.

(N.B. Toe covered shoes must be worn in all technology classes – this is a requirement from OSH.)

**Socks:** Girls—White ankle socks (worn with shoes, not sandals). Black Stockings optional for winter. Boys—Navy School socks (worn pulled up).

**Sun smart Hats/ Caps** – your appropriate choice worn correctly, no logos.

#### **IMPORTANT**

- \* All clothes must be clearly named and looked after.
- \* No make-up or nail polish to be worn.
- \* Jewellery. One piece of jewellery may be worn apart

from one pair of studs/sleepers for pierced ears.

\* Nose-studs, eyebrow studs, tongue studs or any other

body piercing are not permitted at school.

- \* Plain Navy-Blue Beanies / scarves may be worn in winter.
- \* There is no need to experiment with outrageous hair colouring 'au natural'.
